

# Skiing in the Colorado Sunshine

We had 34 members on out trip to Crested Butte at the end of January. Don't remember much about the flight from Cleveland to Houston as we had to get up at 3 in the morning so we could arrive the recommended 2 hours before our 6:15 departure. Nice flight

and we changed planes from a 737 to an ERJ which is a much smaller plane, 2 seats on each side and a lot less baggage room. Needless to say, when we landed in Gunnison, 31 of our group's bags were missing, 90 minutes later we were on our shuttle for the short 20-minute journey to our accommodations, the time it took to register our missing bags caused us to miss our grocery and beverage store stop as our drivers had other pickups. 18 of the bags arrived just before midnight on Saturday, the remainder on Sunday, before 6 PM. Unfortunately, a few could not get on the mountain due to missing equipment, others went on a shopping spree, compliments of United, it allowed us to ski with our equipment still enroute.

We stayed at the Elevation Hotel and Spa, the only ski in, ski out hotel on the mountain, we later found out that this used to be a Club Med property. It had all of the conveniences required, a small pool, sauna, hot tubs (Inside and out) and a full spa. In the main lobby there is a bar, restaurant and a valet attended ski and board storage. The lifts are a minute walk from there.



After taking the 5–10-minute free shuttle bus into town for grocery and other supplies we met in a conference room on the first floor for our welcome reception. Cocktails were served along with various Mexican style appetizers. John, the banquet manager spoke for about 45 minutes on the hotel, mountain, town and everything else we needed to know, many questions we asked.

Crested Butte is known as the North American birthplace of inbounds extreme skiing and riding. Nestled in the heart of the Rockies and steeped in 1800s mining history, Crested Butte and Gunnison offer many winter activities. Brave the exciting slopes of Crested Butte Mountain Resort, forge your own path on cross-country skis and head to town for good eats and authentic mountain hospitality.

Unless you're visiting on a holiday, don't worry about lift lines, and even then, you won't find yourself waiting more than a few minutes. With 15 lifts capable of handling 20,310 people per hour, lift lines are always quick and easy. Most days the mountain sees less than 2,000 people, giving you and your group exceptional time and space to explore the 1,500+ acres of terrain. The mountain has 162 trails surrounded by the Elk Mountains in every direction, the longest being 2.6 miles from the Peak to Treasury. You'll have to make a small hike from the Silver Queen lift to reach the peak at 12,200 feet.



# On Sunday we woke up to the beautiful

**Colorado blue sky** with temperatures at a low of 23 and up to 40's in the afternoon. (Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday were all

carbon copies) this would be the busiest day with skiers and boarders, we only had a few minutes wait at the primary lift. There was no significant new snow for 5 days before we arrived but conditions held up quite well all week. We have a suggested lunch location every day so we can get together to discuss

what we did in the morning, make plans for the afternoon and a chance to ski with others. We had 3 different locations, Paradise was next to the Paradise Lift that has a large multi-level deck most of us sat there in the sunshine Sunday and Wednesday, Thursday was a bit cooler so we were inside. Umbrella Bar is at top of easier blue and green runs, we sunned ourselves in

**Great views** we noticed that Keystone (a nice black run) had been groomed (as it was for the rest of the week), a run we visited numerous times afterwards. Finally, Butte 66 was at the base right next to our hotel, we ate outside on Tuesday and inside Friday as it was snowing, an inch or so at the bottom, 3-5 inches up top of the mountain. This place had actually run out of chicken wings from Sunday's football games.

After another sunny day of fun, Monday, on the mountain most of us headed into town for a very laid-back pub crawl, we visited three establishments, Irwin Brewing, Eldo Brewery and Secret Stash. The problem with a pub crawl after a day of skiing, everyone is very hungry

so the group splits up but find each other eventually or on the shuttle bus. Irwin was not typical bar food enjoyed by 12-15 of the group, menu included Elk meatloaf, saloon fish n' chips, shrimp and grits. Another dozen or so ate at Eldo Brewery featuring Himalayan food that everyone was talking about the rest of the week. Finally Secret Stash for a beer and slice of gourmet pizza before taking the shuttle back.

Wednesday we had a local catering company prepare an Italian dinner consisting of pasta, Italian sausage, salad, gooey garlic bread, cookies and brownies. The food was good and plentiful, unfortunately the hotel told me that we couldn't bring any outside food or alcohol so we were stuck without a room. Food was delivered to my room and served where the group either went to their rooms or the fist floor lobby (Main lobby was on first floor) not the social event I was expecting but a few of us stayed up late socializing anyways.

Thursday was a little cooler and cloudy, our group headed for first run down International, a long groomed black with nice steep spots but the visibility was very tough after all the sunshine we had the four previous days. A change of goggles (I rarely carry extras) and we were ready to have another fun, challenging day where I actually skied the most vertical of the week. As we were having our daily Vista Beer on International the clouds parted and sunshine guided us down to the base, sun glasses in the hot tub again!

Friday, we had over an inch of snow at the base and a few more up at the peak, giving us opportunity to ski over the obstacles we had been avoiding all week. My son Rob and Eddy decided this was the day they were going to ski all of the double blacks and chutes. That evening we all gathered on the first floor for pizza, food and beverages leftover from the rooms, there was a lot of storytelling and laughs. We did get a group picture on the stairs.

Saturday morning, we headed to the airport, it took them over 2 hours to check the group in and the plane was late coming from Houston. We then waited in the plane as the crew were checking on the weights including a walk down the aisle by the pilots eyeballing the size of the passengers. Good thing we're all in half decent shape and not overweight! As we started pushback, I noticed a cart with skis sitting there and on top there was Joe's purple Hi Rise bag, we ended up have 9 sets of skis and one board not arrive home with is, the were delivered Sunday night (That plane was also 3 hours late) and I am driving to Toronto tomorrow so I can visit Rob and Calli, and drop off their equipment.



Aside from the airline issue I thought that it was a great trip and everyone appeared to be having fun and getting along well. Thanks for joining us on the trip.

# New Directional Signs at Telluride

Now that the Crested Butte trip is in the books, we look forward to the Telluride trip in March. The pictures and videos of Telluride look majestic, but how do we get around the area? Okay, so they give us a map and off we go. But where is the run??? "It's over here." someone says, "I think... I really can't see a sign." Yes, signs are more important than you think. Is it a black diamond or a green circle? So, signage is an important aspect of every ski area. Some areas have better signs than others.

Have you ever thought where these signs come from? Probably not. Let's look at Telluride. It has, over 600 directional signs...WOW! When they first opened the park, the signs were made with the latest vinyl lettering with plastic inserts. Over time the sun and harsh weather made them unreadable, and each one had to be replaced. Every five years, in fact, every sign was changed out. What task, expensive, too.

In 2010, Jim Greene, a 28-year veteran Ski Patroller began his summer task to reinvent and replace all 600 signs. He chose cedar wood signs and lettering. This natural wood will last for many years. As a matter of fact, those early samples installed in 2010 are still in service after 14 years and have much more life to them. Jim makes each sign by hand. The new signs look better, last longer, and are easier to read. And now Telluride no longer fills a landfill with 600 obsolete signs every five years. A win for everyone!

So now when you navigate the Telluride terrain this March, you'll be better able to get around; and... now that you know all about Telluride signs, you'll have a great conversation starter on the lift! # Hi Rise Racer News

#### CO RACE CHAIRS- GUY NERREN & RICK GZEDH

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MEMBERSHIP- You must be a member of Hi Rise to race on our team. Contact Guy, Rick, or Nate Diederich. RACE SCHEDULES- Are available at meetings, on our Web Site. In our NEWSLETTER, on CMSC WEB SITE. ADVANCE REGISTRATION FOR RACES- Forms are available at meetings, on our WEB SITE, and in our

NEWSLETTER. Hi Rise will pay race fees for those who advance register and attend 5 or more races. Some races will be advance register only. To register yourself late on race day will cost you at least \$25.00 per race. COMBINED RACE WEEKENDS- SKIER COMBINED is at Bristol. SNOWBOARDER COMBINED is at

Swain II. BOTH require advance registration. NO registration on race day. BOTH require that you have two races started prior to the combined event.

WORK ASSIGNMENTS- For each race, one-third of our racers may be assigned to work that race. Assignments are posted in the bib pick up area. It is your responsibility to check the list. If you are assigned to work, show up at least 15 minutes prior to the start of the race, If you prefer to work at or not work at a particular race, let Guy or Rick know at least a week in advance. RACERS WHO FAIL TO SHOW FOR WORK ASSIGNMENTS WILL BE Dqd. HELMETS- Are required for every race.

NO BYOB- Please do not bring your own booze onto the ski area premises.

LIFT TICKETS- Some areas may offer discounts for racers and may ask to see your bib. Others may only sell online. DQ & RESULT SHEETS- Are usually posted in the bib pick up area about one hour after the last race of the day. It is

your responsibility to check to verify your race times and/or any DQ. If you dispute either the times or the DQ, find Guy or Rick to discuss the issue and possibly file a protest. The time limit to do so is 30 minutes after posting.

START TIMES- For most races will be 10:00 AM for the first GROUP of the day. Some races may start earlier. RACE ORDER- For most races will be: GROUP I SKIERS: Super Senior Vets, Open Elite, AAW, AAM, AW, AM, BBBM, A Qualifiers. Then, after about 45 minutes, GROUP II SKIERS: Senior Vets, BBW, BBM, BW, BM, CCW, CCM, CM C Qualifiers, Then ALL SNOW BOARDERS. A few races may have different start orders which are posted in the bib pick up area.

CLASS CHANGES- If you wish to ask to change your assigned race class, you must do do through Guy or Rick, at least seven days prior to the next race.


